Our Faculty Spotlight this month is... Dr. Jim Ball!



Academy for the Visual & Performing Arts

Dr. Ball is the Director for the Academy for Visual and Preforming Arts, as well as the Associate Dean of the College of Performance Visualization Fine Arts. He has worked at Texas A&M since July of 2015, almost a decade.

Through his work, he brings fine arts performances to campus and talks about elevating the arts ecology at TAMU. He talks about sustainability, the arts, and creativity and how having those elements are an important aspect of leading people towards sustainable lives.

What is the focus of your work or research?

"Change the world, just want to change the world.

Make it a better place for everyone to live. I'd say specifically, my motivation with politics theater ... When people talk about the theatricality of politics, they're usually being really negative about that, whereas I think that there's an opportunity there to strengthen our democratic institutions if we take the theatricality of them very seriously. That motivates me as well as for people to stop giving theater a bad name. I do believe strongly in the capacity of the arts to make the world a better place"



SUSTAINABILITY SPOTLIGHT

In your opinion, why is research in different areas of sustainability important?

"Because I think that there won't be an endpoint to sustainability. We're always going to be calibrating how we as a species relate to the world, to each other and to the world around us. And if we think that we've have it all figured out at one moment then as everything changes around us, we're lost. So we need to be constantly adapting and that means doing research. Doing these sorts of research to discover how the world around us is changing because it's not a stable place. And that's okay."



PRESENTING RESEARCH



DURING METABOLISM: A HAPPENING

What is the biggest takeaway from your research/work?

"It's the idea that theatricality and spectatorship are not disempowering in politics, but in fact we can act in politics as spectators. That we have agency as spectators to have an impact and sort of to transform our political systems to a greater or lesser degree. Our institutions are intrinsically theatrical, which provides us the means to engage with them and impact them as citizens."
