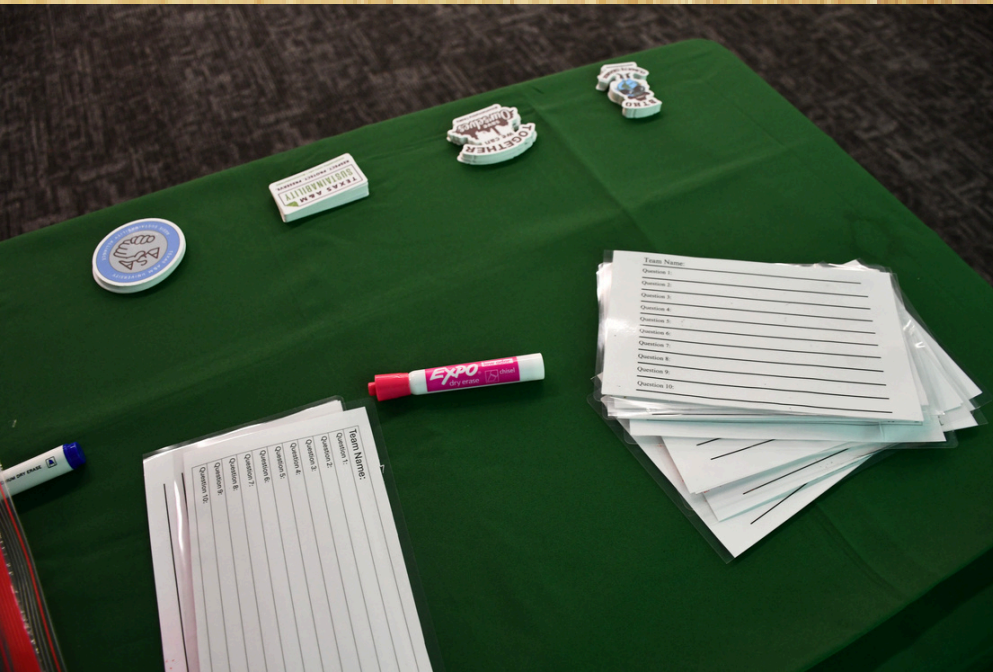

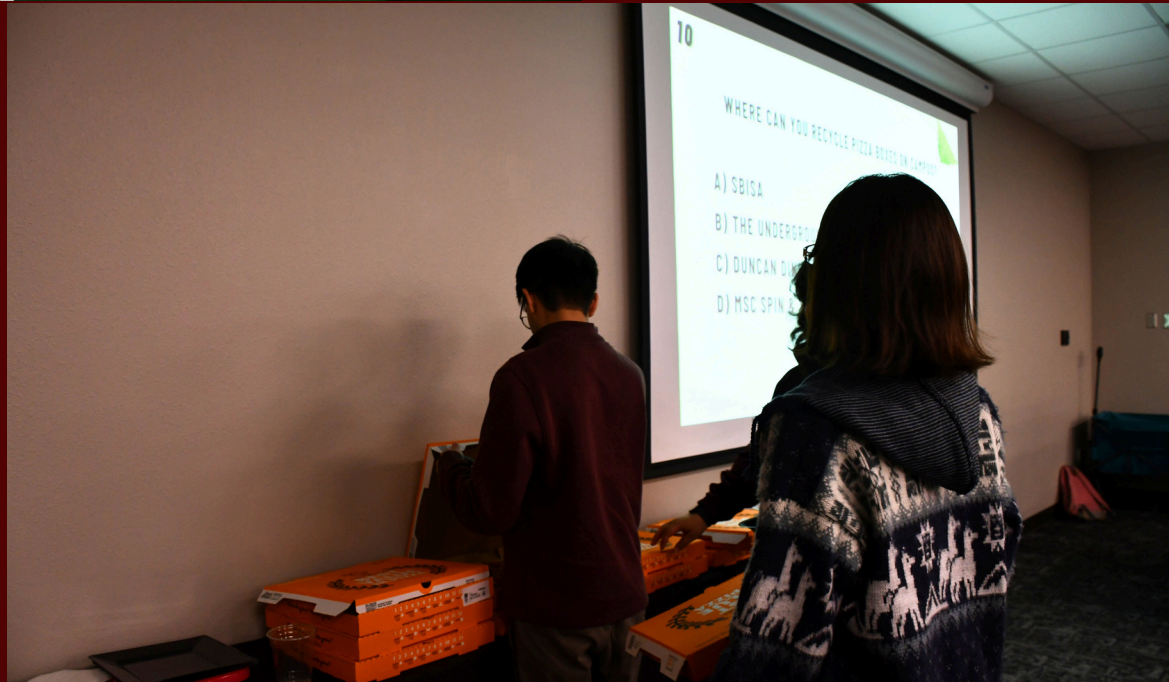

AGGIE GREEN FUND GRANT HIGHLIGHT: SCRAPS TO SPROUTS



“The goal of this project was to start a student-led vermicomposting bin and community garden for students/staff/faculty in the Heep Center. Part of the goal was to take food waste from campus to incorporate into vermicomposting, and build a sustainable, nutrient rich substrate for gardening.”



Scraps to Sprouts was funded by the Aggie Green Fund last year. The student-run project responsibly addresses food security for the campus community, especially beneficial in areas with high cost of living and food scarcity.



What was your motivation to start the project?

“The motivation for this project was to build a gardening community among our peers. One of our goals was to reduce food waste going to landfills, provide fresh produce to the students and staff of Heep Center, and get hands on learning experience with composting using earthworms and learn more about vermicomposting.”



What is required to keep your project going?

To keep this project going, it needs volunteers! To build, and to help prep planting beds, worm bins, as well as planting seedlings, and watering the plants, as well as assisting with management i.e. setting up drip irrigation, weeding, etc. It requires student leadership and volunteering.
