

CAMPUS HIGHLIGHT: PERIOD PROJECT

Period Project strives to provide free and accessible menstrual products on campus. We do this by supplying free menstrual products at various locations on campus and working with departments/the Student Government Association (SGA) to expand the reach of our project.

Through an Aggie Green Fund Grant, we received funding for two period product dispensers and menstrual products. We continually restock these dispensers, found in the first floor of Evans and the Annex, in addition to a display case in the second floor family bathroom in Evans and product bins in the Plant Pathology and Microbiology (PLPM) building.



CAMPUS HIGHLIGHT: PERIOD PROJECT

What was the motivation to start the project?

We had a guest speaker from AGF present at one of H.E.A.T.'s general meetings that got us fired up! The human and environmental committees teamed up and brainstormed ideas for projects that could positively benefit the student body while also increasing sustainability on campus. In a matter of minutes we all agreed that a project revolving around sustainable menstrual products was the perfect combination of an environmental and humanitarian project that both committees could collaborate on.



We felt like we could really make a difference in Aggieland since access to menstrual products back then was very scarce.



CAMPUS HIGHLIGHT: PERIOD PROJECT



What are the long-term goals of your project?

Our project's long-term goal is to have menstrual product dispensers located all around campus! We want to have period products readily available, consistently stocked, and maintained by the university to promote comfort, convenience, and well-being.

What advice would you give to someone wanting to do a similar project?

The implementation of your project will likely take longer than you expect, and unforeseen hurdles are sure to come up. However, don't be discouraged by trials and tribulations! Remind yourself of why you want to do this and what impact your project will have. Additionally, don't be afraid to reach out to people, even if you feel like they will be too busy or not care about your initiative. There's a chance they won't respond, but we've made wonderful connections or have been redirected to relevant sources from simply deciding to send an email.
